All exhibits will be vetted for quality and authenticity by a committee of experts and will be in a condition ready for people's homes and private collections. 'This ensures that buyers can make their purchases with confidence and is the mark of a good quality fair,' explains Sue, who appreciates that anyone who invests in fine quality antiques needs professional reassurance.

Among the many rare exhibits on offer will be a superb range of American and European costume jewellery from the 1230s to 1970s, with pieces by designer names including Lea Stein, Trifari, Cartier, Coco Chanel and Miriam Haskell. Brooches, earrings, necklaces and other pieces from less than £50 will be on sale from Brieve Antiques, jewellery specialists from Wales.

By contrast, Saunders Fine Art from the West Midlands will be showing a range of 18th, 19th and early 20th century paintings, including portraits and landscapes, with prices from several hundred pounds to more than £20,000.

From South Yorkshire, Fu Ts'ang Lung Oriental Antiques specialise in the collectable artifacts of China and Tibet, with religious and secular decorative pieces on sale, including statues of the Buddha. From East Yorkshire, John Newton will be showing a selection of rare European porcelain, while from West Yorkshire, Mark Buckley specialises in 19th and early 20th century mahogany and walnut furniture.

Also on sale will be a range of antiquarian maps, Victorian silver, Persian carpets and rugs, English pottery and porcelain, Japanese netsuke, Victorian watercolours, and fine scent bottles.
